

# Lakes Region edges W-FL in Class B wrestling test

TRUMANSBURG — The Wayne-Finger Lakes Class B wrestling championship team will be dominated by Lakes Region grapplers this year when the combined league sends its two representative teams to the Section 5 finals at Caledonia Saturday.

In an interleague wrestle off last night, seven Lakes region wrestlers made it to the first team while five from the Wayne-Finger Lakes won spots. Losers, however, don't hang up their uniforms this year as in the past.

The losers also go to the tournament where they get another chance.

Winners of last night's action will form one team which will meet the runners-up from Livingston County while the losers will go into action against the Livingston County champions.

Trumansburg and Victor share honors on the championship team, each placing four. Watkins Glen added two while Dundee and North Rose each have one. In addition, Trumansburg will enter an unlimited wrestler in the tournament. He was unopposed since the W-FL did not enter an unlimited grappler this season.

Victor's entries are headed by three time Section 5 Class B champion Penn Sheldon, competing at 145 pounds this season.

Sheldon remained undefeated with an 18-0 record when he defeated Odessa's Rocky Teeter in a battle of unbeaten wrestlers. Teeter, tournament's outstanding wrestler, lost 7-1, and now has a 14-1 record.

Other Victor wrestlers winning last night included Bob Garlock at 103 pounds, who defeated Bill Birch of Odessa, 8-3; Bob Grath at 127 pounds, who won handily over South Seneca's Jerry Walawander, 17-2, and Jim Winkler, 165 pounder, who scored a 6-3 decision over Jeff Willard of Trumansburg.

Trumansburg advanced Ben Babcock at 120 pounds, who scored a 6-4 decision over Don Neil of Marion; Steve Welch who scored a 5-4 decision over Victor's Terry Cotton at 133 pounds; Ron King, who scored a 7-6 win over Gene Cologgi of Victor at 154 pounds, and Mike Carver, who won a 7-0 victory over Tom Lauder of Victor at 175 pounds.

Bob Lewis of Watkins Glen scored the only pin of the night when he nailed Victor's Dennis Cody in the 95 pound match in 2:45.

George Bond joined Lewis on the first team when he scored a 9-0 win over Victor's Ron Bowerman in the 112 pound match.

Dundee's Mike Skorusa also advanced by beating Victor's Dave DeMitty, 6-3, in the 138 pound division and North Rose heavyweight Chris Gillcrest scored an 8-2 decision over Dundee's Tom Carruthers.

Among the more exciting matches was the 120 pound scrap between Babcock and Neil.

Babcock scored two first period takedowns while Neil had two escapes as Babcock took a 4-2 lead. After a scoreless second period, Neil scored a late reversal to tie the score, but Babcock quickly reversed to win, 6-4.

At 133 pounds, Cotton was penalized two points for stalling which wound up costing him the match. Trailing, 2-1 after two periods, Cotton allowed Welch to escape but then got a takedown to tie the match. But Welch quickly reversed and won, though Cotton got a point for riding time.

It was much the same at 154 pounds. King of T-Burg took a 3-2 lead in the first period while Cologgi scored two escapes to a takedown for King in the second period, leaving King on top, 5-4, after two periods.

Cologgi scored at escape in the third period but King got a takedown and won, 7-6, in spite of a point for riding time for Cologgi.

In a rarity in tournaments like this, not a single first period went scoreless and in only one match was there less than one takedown.

## Skin color — Robinson can see only one reason Negroes don't manage

MIAMI (AP) — Frank Robinson of the Baltimore Orioles disclaimed any thoughts of being a crusader, but he has stepped

front and center as a target for racial abuse by fighting skin color as the reason major league baseball has never had a Negro major league manager.

"There's only one reason a Negro has never been a manager—his color," Robinson said

quietly and without apparent emotion Wednesday. "And as far as the coaching positions being handed out, they're show-case jobs as far as I'm concerned."

"It's not something I just feel. I know it."

"You can't tell me that since Jackie Robinson broke in no Negro has been qualified to manage. I can't buy that—not when you look at guys like Larry Doby and George Crowe and then look at some of the guys that are managing in the majors."

Robinson, who took what many say is the first step to becoming a manager by handling the Santurce in the Puerto Rican Winter League, discussed the sensitive subject after the Orioles' clubhouse after the team's first full-scale workout.

"I know when this appears in the papers, I'll get mail from a bunch of racist kooks," Robinson said. "But you don't worry about that. You have to consider the source. And this is no campaign. I am not trying to knock down any doors."

Didn't Robinson think that stars such as Ernie Banks of the Chicago Cubs, Jim Gilliam of the Los Angeles Dodgers and Elston Howard of the New York Yankees were in line for managerial positions now that they held coaching jobs?

"It's nothing but showcase," he answered. "How can you say anything else? That's all it's been. No one has moved any farther than being a coach."

"I thought Banks had the best opportunity, but then the Cubs gave Durocher a new contract. I don't think Gilliam is in line if

(Manager Walter) Alston leaves, and (Mickey) Mantle and (Whitey) Ford, guys like that, are probably ahead of Howard with the Yankees."

Robinson, however, did acknowledge that the day would come when a Negro would be managing, but he declined to look into the future and find a rapidly approaching date.

"There's a possibility there will be one eventually," he said. "If it comes about it's another thing. It will take an owner with guts before that happens, an owner like Branch Rickey, with the willingness to stand up and take abuse—because he's going to get it."

And what about himself? Did Robinson feel that managing in the winter leagues had been a breakthrough?

"I don't see how anyone can see it as a breakthrough," he replied. "It's nothing as far as breaking a barrier down in the states. But it's a way of guarding against anyone saying I didn't have any experience and wasn't qualified."

"There's no excuse with me."
