

earned his second Division II (small-school) state title in early March. He then won the National High School Coaches Association Sophomore National Championship last weekend in Virginia Beach, Va., despite pulled cartilage in his left knee.

Schuth lost just one match out of 41 this season on his way to the 189-pound Division I (large-school) state title. The Brockport heavyweight answered every challenge he faced, including three tournament meetings with 200-match winner, Ryan Lamagra, his friend at Webster Thomas.

"Getting wrestler of the year is kind of a big deal," Schuth said. "There were three other state champions (from large schools, 10 overall) and I got it over them.

"I just stay focused on what I had to do to win, regardless of who I had to wrestle."

There are 32 wrestlers on the AGR team, 16 from large schools and 16 from small schools, and the AGR Coach of the Year is Spencerport's Bill Jacoutot.

The group includes Bryan Bourne, a Spencerport junior who won the 160-pound NHSCA's national junior championship last weekend in Virginia. It's his second national title in less than a year. Bourne won a national cadet-level freestyle championship in July.

Paul Paddock, Ian's older brother and one of Warsaw's middleweights, was a runner-up in the NHSCA's senior-level

tournament.

Webster Thomas' Robert Eskander (second), Palmyra-Macedon's Alex Ekstrom (third) and Tyler Marlow (fifth), Brockport's Christian Boley (fifth) and Webster Schroeder's Torsten Gillespie (seventh) were among the other AGR team members who had top-eight finishes last weekend.

Ian Paddock injured his knee during a workout before the national tournament. "I went and got a big brace," Paddock said. "It hurt, but I could wrestle with it.

"There's a difference between pain and injury. When it hurt too much, I'd take injury time during the match and walk it out."

Paddock wrestled two matches during each of the first two days of the tournament. He won the national championship and completed a dominant run with an 8-2 victory over Virginia's Mike Garofalo.

"This is probably the biggest accomplishment for me," Paddock said. "I don't show much emotion after I win.

"It would've been really nice if Paul would've been able to win, too. Still, it was a great accomplishment. It's weird to think about (being a national champion)."

Schuth knocked off an opponent that was ranked second nationally on his way to the senior-level quarterfinals, where he lost. He fell one win short of a top-eight finish and All-American status.

"I totally blew my match in the All-American round," Schuth said. "I had multiple opportunities to score, and didn't."

It was another reminder that there is always room to improve. "There's one level where people out there know your name," Schuth said. "It's, 'Yeah, he's good.'

"Then there's the level where people say, 'He's really good, one of the top kids in the state.' I was always underrated. People knew that I was tough, but they didn't know how tough I actually was."

Ohio University coaches decided that Schuth would be a good fit into the Bobcats' line-up. Schuth has committed to Ohio, where he plans to wrestle at 184 pounds. Binghamton also recruited Schuth.

"I think I have a real good chance of starting next year," Schuth said.

"My coach (Joel Greenlee) told me he wants me to work really hard and have the confidence that I can start."
